Our Feature Member

An interview with Barbara Rosenthal MPHF

Barbara Rosenthal has been a member of our club since January 2001. She was the first woman to join our club. In this interview, she shares some of his personal pursuits, as well as ideas and causes she finds of interest.



Tell me a little about yourself:

I was born in Gatley, and we moved to Cheadle when I was 11, and my Nana, who I spent a lot of my childhood with, lived next to Chris Walker's family on Cherington Road!!

I hated school. When I left at the age of 14, people said "You will remember your school days, as the best days of your life" I thought, crikey, it gets worse than this? if Star Wars had been around then, it would have been 'Beam me up now Scotty!!!

However, I was accepted at Hollins College in Fallowfield (known as the 'Toast Rack') to study Fashion Design and Pattern Cutting. Our family had a ladies outerwear company in Manchester which my Dad had taken over before I was born, I absolutely loved college, and took over the design and pattern cutting for the company when I completed my training in 1965, but the building on Hulme Street was subject to a CPO in 1973.



Sadly, the company closed and as my Dad's health was declining somewhat, he bought a newsagent / sweet shop / tobacconist in Gatley which he really enjoyed running.

I was living in Belgium then with my first husband Geoff, who was a petrochemical engineer, and subsequently moved to Aberdeen when he was working on the oil rigs there. I returned to Manchester and began working with fashion agent JS Levy on Lever Street who represented many high-end companies, including Christian Dior Ready to Wear, I was then catwalk modelling for the company. It all seems so unbelievable now!!

I had a real career change in 1976 when I began working as a chef for very popular wine bars in Alderley Edge and Hale, during which time I had my first daughter Lizzie in 1983, I loved this work, but had to give it up in 1991 due to the onset of Osteo Arthritis, but I had my second daughter (then Arabella / Abbey) now Bella and started training as a Counsellor at Manchester University.

I remember the first time I was walked into the Whitworth Building. I expected a large hand to descend from the sky, and knock my hat off saying "What do you think you are doing here?" but against all the odds, I was successful, and I graduated in 1994, having done my work placement with Cruse Bereavement Care. Interestingly my Diploma was signed by Eddie Newcombe, who was a member of our Club. I went on to do a teaching qualification, and taught Counselling at Stockport College for 10 years.

What led you to join the Rotary Club?

My Dad was so important in my life, and he was a founder member of Gatley and District Rotary, I could see how much this meant to him, and it strongly fitted with his values, and community spirit. When Royston Flude, then RCM President, invited me to speak to the club about Cruse Bereavement Care, and invited me to join as the first woman member, I was very excited to accept his invitation. It seems strange now, that this was only 19 years ago, but it was seen as ground-breaking then. The rest as they say, 'is history!'

What kinds of things do you like to do, when you are not working?

I still love to cook for friends and family, and I also enjoy being outside, engaging with nature and the environment, which hopefully, I have passed these passions on to my grandchildren. My main and enduring passion is for live music and theatre. Even at my great age, I still go to live music of all genres. Manchester has such a wealth of venues from the Arena down to Soup Kitchen with a maximum capacity of 200 people.

What movies do you like? What music do you like? What food do you like?

I don't go to the cinema as much as I used to. Maybe I will start going again. I love all types of food, from Traditional English to Asian Fusion, and everything in between. My taste in music is very broad -from Classical and Opera to modern artists like Muse, Lewis Capaldi, Chemical Brothers, and Amy Winehouse. Too many to mention here!

What inspires you or motivates you in life?

My family, daughters Bella and Lizzie, and grandchildren Dylan, Jude and Belle are by far the most important aspects of my life, I love being part of the Rotary family and the fact that it allows me to contribute back to society.

What are some causes you care about?

My passion is for supporting adults and children who have been bereaved, through my work with Cruse Bereavement Care. This year is our 60th Anniversary, and 10 years ago, the Queen, who is our royal Patron, held an event at St James Palace. I was invited to meet her to represent the work Cruse does with Children and Young People. Given the fact that this was 10 years ago, and the young princes had not spoken publicly about their bereavement, I was somewhat surprised, but very pleased, when she said to me "My grandsons want me to tell you how much they value the work Cruse does with bereaved children".

Roy Chapman PHF An update on Rotary and Operation Florian

The Goal
Fire Equipment for
Every Firefighter

Our October 24th meeting, featured, club member Roy Chapman PHF, who gave a talk on his recent trip to Lebanon, as part of the Operation Florian, and our club's involvement in the project.

Rotary and Operation Florian - by Roy Chapman -

Operation Florian, led by Steve Jordan, a Station Manager with Greater Manchester Fire and Rescue Service (GMFRS), first visited Lebanon working with the Lebanese Civil Defence (LCD) and Save the Children in 2016.

At just 10,452 km² (4,036 sq. mi.), Lebanon is the smallest recognised sovereign state on the mainland of the Asian continent. The population is some 6 million. The largest city, and capital is Beirut, with a population of around 2.2 million in the metropolitan area.

During that first visit Steve, met many Lebanese firefighters and was inspired by their commitment to their communities and country and how many give up their own time for the protection of others. Lebanon has some 5,000 firefighters, all volunteers. They face many challenges on a daily basis. Critically what struck Steve most was the very distinct lack of personal protective equipment ('PPE' – comprising fire tunic, leggings, boots, gloves, fire hoods, helmets etc.) and also specialist equipment for such things as water rescue and road traffic collisions, compared to what is the norm in the UK.



Obviously, funding and resourcing a national fire service is a challenge whatever the size of the country.

Since 2016 Op Florian has returned twice and formed a good relationship with Nabil Salhani (National Training Officer of the LCD) and the firefighters at Zahle, the Bekaa Valley and elsewhere. There have already been some successes. In January this year (2019) Operation Florian shipped out a container of 450 full sets of PPE and 3 sets of hydraulic rescue equipment (for use in road traffic collisions). These are now providing welcome additional protection and help to firefighters.

In addition, another critical success is that Operation Florian gained additional funding to continue to provide technical assistance to Save the Children. A detailed assessment of fire risks in Informal Tented Settlements (ITSs) has just been completed. Working with specialist fire research departments in UK universities, a detailed technical report, proposing fire risk mitigation interventions, has just been completed.

Another worthwhile achievement was that Operation Florian was able to fund taking two female firefighters – Sabine and Rose - to the UK to attend the national Women in the Fire Service training weekend in June this year. There are a number of female firefighters in the LCD, who are just as hard working and equal to their male colleagues. Seeking opportunities to inspire them more is a further commitment of Operation Florian Both Sabine and Rose gained much out of their visit and it is hoped more can be done for female LCD firefighters.

Since 2010, Operation Florian has been supported by Rotary. In that year the Rotary Club of Manchester sponsored a fire engine to go to Kavardaci in Macedonia. Other Rotary Clubs in the UK have also provided additional funding. In 2015 Steve Jordan was awarded a Paul Harris Fellowship by the Rotary Club of Manchester.

A wonderful, and very welcome development, is that Operation Florian has established a link with the Rotary Club of Baabta. They are no enthusiastically supporting Operation Florian. It is hoped a firm friendship and international link can be established between the Rotary Clubs of Baabta and Manchester.

In January 2020 Op Florian is hoping to ship a further 500 sets of PPE to Lebanon for the LCD. Northampton Fire and Rescue has donated a huge amount of equipment. The added good news is that Operation Florian has been offered further PPE -well over 1,000 sets of tunics, trousers and boots. There is potentially much more equipment available in the UK – if the shipping and import costs can be met. One small issue is a shortage of fire helmets, but Operation Florian is trying to source some.



Finally, Operation Florian has just had two Volvo FL6 fire engines released to it by GMFRS. It is hoped both of these can eventually come to Lebanon – again hopefully with further support from Rotary.


