





ROTARY CLUB MEETING – JUNE 24, 2021 PRESIDENT DEREK EVANS VALEDICTORY AND HANDOVER TO INCOMING PRESIDENT ROY CHAPMAN



With more than 15 members present, President Derek gave his valedictory address over Zoom.

He mentioned how this was an unusual year with no meetings in person and how we all had to adapt to a changing life with Covid restrictions, but that we still managed to function.

There were charity casualties, such as the Butler Street Monday Club and our annual Christmas collection at the Arndale Centre with the police choir BUT still managed to have a MacMillan Coffee Morning on Zoom and still contributed to Shoe Aid UK, the Beirut Disaster, the India Covid Crisis, and charities such as Support Dogs and Plan International. Derek reminded us that we had great speakers such as the Lord Mayor, the District Governor, the Rotary Club of London, members from Rotary in Lebanon, and our own Rotary Scholar Dr Jyotika Virmani. Zoom gave our club more flexibility as many speakers were not in Manchester but in places around the world.

Our fellowship was a problem with no meeting up or dining out allowed, but we continued and included various themes to make it more interesting such as quizzes, climate change, along with favourite movies and books. He stressed the importance of meeting and socialising in person again and September is our target date.

Update India Covid-19 Appeal Collaborative Project

We close this current Rotary on a high note and celebrate the tremendous success that our District 1285 clubs have collectively made, in swiftly responding to the India Covid-19 appeal. I am pleased to say that more than three-quarters of the clubs in District 1285 responded to the appeal and have given their overwhelming support.

- 1. Just over a handful of the clubs generously contributed to RGBI's Disaster Emergency Committee Response to Covid-19 India appeal. This went towards supporting India's health care system by providing PPE, soap, hand washing stations, and essential food supplies to vulnerable families.
- 2. Forty-Seven other District clubs and a few private donors, collectively have raised just over £21,000.

All donations have been meticulously managed by our very efficient District Treasurer Dennis Hobson. Thank you, Dennis, for your help and support.

We purchased and sent out 28 oxygen concentrators (10 litres and 5 litres machines) to Rotary District 3040, which has 94 clubs with approximately 2400 members. The clubs are located in Central India, covering parts of Madhya Pradesh and Gujrat states.

The first batch of the machines went during the peak period of the crisis. Oxygen Concentrators were purchased from Toshniwala Industries Private Ltd. The owner of this company Rajiv Toshniwala is a Rotarian in Rotary District 3053. Rotarian Rajiv has also thrown in several infrared thermometers and finger pulse oximeters with our order.

The total cost for these 28 oxygen concentrators, including bank transfers, is £20,178.34 The residual surplus, amounting to £ 992.66 has been sent to DEC India appeal. A very big round of applause to all District 1285 clubs for a very successful collaborative service project - "Gift of Life from Rotary Northwest England and the Isle of Man"



Lakeland Break by Peter Hartley

Derek Evans, Ernie Metcalfe and I enjoyed a 5 day break in the Lake District last month. We spent 2 nights at Derek & Ann's cottage(a former Methodist Chapel) at Newby and then 2 nights at the Borrowdale Gates Hotel at the southern end of Derwentwater . We had a brilliant time and enjoyed different walks each day. The weather was mixed but a great time was had! Derek's daughter, Mandy, very kindly drove us to the restaurants from the cottage, so we did't have to worry about enjoying a drink with our meals and having to drive home.





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I will just mention one walk that we did from Keswick to Threlkeld . Having left one car at the Horse & Farrier at Threlkeld we used the other to get to our starting point near the Leisure Centre at Keswick. The tarmacked 5 km pathway goes along the trackbed of the old Cockermouth, Keswick and Penrith railway that goes through the beautiful tree- clad Greta Gorge. Five years ago Storm Desmond hit Cumbria and destroyed this trail and now the National Park Authority ,having spent £7.9M on the project, re-opened recently the new and improved route. The storm brought the worst floods the county had seen with approx 178 mm of rain falling

in Keswick . As a result 2 of the original Victorian railway bridges that cross the River Greta and about 200 metres of path were washed away. These bridges were replaced and another repaired and

they re-opened the Bobbin Mill tunnel for

the first time in 50 years.

The trail has been fully reconnected and enhanced, with new picnic benches, seats and perches at viewpoints have been installed as well as signage along the route giving information on the local history and heritage story of the trail and giving information on the local wildlife and flora and fauna.

Work as been done to protect the riverbank from future flooding and stone filled baskets have been installed to provide additional strength to the banks to prevent future bank erosion . 35 oak saplings have been planted alongside the exisiting oak woodland . This mixture of tree ages helps provide habitat and a food source for many insects ,birds and other animals including the red squirrel.

This new trail means that wheelchair users can use it that previously would have been unable to. On the day in question there were quite a number of walkers enjoying this excellent walk.

The views along the route are splendid and, as it started raining as we neared Threlkeld, it was a welcome sight to see the Horse and Farrier come into sight. Our lunch had been booked in advance due to COVID-19 requirements. After having our victuals, we drove back to Keswick to collect the other car and made our way to the Borrowdale Gates Hotel in Grange to continue our Lakeland Break!

Savings on water and power

- Don't leave gadgets on standby for long periods
- Turn off unnecessary lights
- Don't turn on lights when not needed
- Put a full load in the dishwasher
- Put a full load in the washing machine
- Wash clothes at the lowest or most economical temperature
- Whenever possible dry clothes outside or inside in place of a spin dryer
- Cook whenever possible with a microwave (e.g. soups and drinks)
- Put only the required water in a kettle
- Use any spare boiling water to kill weeds in place of weed killer
- · Shower instead of bathing
- Share a bath
- Shower for a shorter time
- Shower only when needed
- Turn central heating down a little and wear an extra sweater
- Install solar panels
- Wash clothes a little less often
- Flush toilet less often
- Place a brick or similar in the toilet cistern
- Fit a water meter (this often reduces water usage)
- Mend dripping taps
- Wash the car less often
- Collect rainwater for the garden
- Don't use hosepipe on the garden most plants and lawns will recover
- Run taps slower when washing hands etc.

BEIRUT DISASTER APPEAL UPDATE

Rtn Roy G Chapman PHF, President 2021-2022, Rotary Club of Manchester

After the terrible Beirut Port explosion of August 4th 2020, we launched an appeal to raise money to help with reconstruction work. We already had a partnership with the Rotary Club of Baabda in Beirut (see below). We raised some \$3,200. This went to Baabda to use in focused efforts. The money has gone towards rebuilding the School of the Immaculate Conception – located in a poor district of the city. The RC of Milano Nord Ovest (Italy) donated Euros 3,000 to two Clubs in Lebanon, the RC of Beirut Cedars and the RC of Baabda (this makes approx. \$3,600).

The IMMACULÉE CONCEPTION SCHOOL in Geitawi/Ashrafieh was severely damaged from the Beirut port explosions. They are still making repairs but they need almost everything. Sister Marlene Youssef asked for 10 digital interactive boards. The cost is \$1,000 each set. Therefore the project cost is \$10,000. The RC of Beirut Cedars agreed to use in partnership with us, the Italian donation of approx. \$3,600 and to contribute with 50% of the remaining \$6,400, i.e. \$3,200 from the RC of Beirut Cedars and \$3,200 from our club. The donation received from the RC of Manchester fits perfectly with the amount of the Baabda's contribution.

This is an important first step and can be built upon. It is great to achieve some good at the school. It is such an important part of the community and the children are the future. The Rotary Club of Manchester has a long history of working with Operation Florian – the firefighter charity – on humanitarian projects, from Macedonia to Lebanon. There is a close fit between the ethos of Rotary and Florian in humanitarian efforts. In its specialist way the work of Florian underpins the welfare and humanitarian needs of its partner Nations.

With our re-use of perfectly serviceable PPE and equipment that would otherwise be scraped or finish-up in landfill, Florian is also closely linked to Rotary's new focus on the environment.

The work in Macedonia is all but finished. In Lebanon the efforts were halted by the Covid 19 crisis. Things in the country have become worse, following Covid 19, the huge explosion in the dock area in August last year, plus the endemic corruption of the political system and the collapse of the economy.

Operation Florian hope to return in 2022. The Club's partnership with Operation Floarian dates back to when I was President in 2010-2011. I had a very encouraging and wide ranging discussion recently with Operation Florian, Fire Aid, Women in the Fire Service, the Rotary Club of Beirut Cosmopolitan, Rotary District 1040 and others. They share the aims and hopes for the Lebanese fire service.

The scope for wider development exists. This could involve the Clubs of Baabda, Cosmopolitan, Cedars and possibly other Clubs across Beirut, the Rotary Club of Manchester, both Districts 1040 and 1285 and the other organisations referred to above. More information to follow.

Celery and Apple Soup Serves 6

1 large Bramley apple
1 medium onion
1 small leek
2 pints/1.12 litres
vegetable stock
1oz/30g Flora
margarine

1oz/30g plain flour

Thinly slice the celery across the grain and finely chop the onion and leek.

Sweat the onion, leek, and celery in the margarine in the pan. Add the flour and cook for about 3 minutes.

Boil up the vegetable stock and add the ingredients.

Peel, core and dice the apple and add to the soup.

Simmer for 35 minutes then liquidise. Serve immediately.

Rotary District 1285 Litter Picking Month:



The proposal is that in May 2022, all District clubs will be asked to commit to a litter picking week in their respective local areas, as part of the Great British Spring Clean initiative.

No financial outlay is required for this project. The initiative can be widely promoted in the local press and in the social media.

QR Code Community Project:



At a time when fund-raising can be a challenge the QR Code project can support communities by providing easy access to local services through posters displaying QR (Quick Response) codes which use smartphones.

This is a relatively cheap scheme which provides excellent community support.

Excellent community Poster contains QR codes that link the user to specific areas of needs, which includes: Emergency Food Provision and Housing Support, Health & Wellbel Feeling excluded from the Community, Domestic Abuse; Drug & Alcohol Support, Mental Health Support and Volunteering & other Support Organisations.

Once the QR code is scanned it takes the user to a landing page that contains a brief summary of the services each charity / organisation offer, and link to their web sites.

The rollout of the QR Code Community Poster project has been delivered successfully by **St Helens Rotary** and is currently being trialled out in the Stockport area.

This initiative can be easily rolled out across the District 1285.

Never disclose private information such as your phone number, pictures of your home, your address or birthday. This applies to your posts and your profile

Don't accept friend requests from people you don't know. Some online criminals use this as a means of phishing or finding blackmail or sexual offences victims.

Don't do anything you're not comfortable with.

Remember that once a post or photo has been shared, you no longer have control of it. Don't post photos or comments that could end up causing you issues in the future. If you wouldn't want your mum to see it, don't post it.
