

## *From our President Roy Chapman* OUR ENVIRONMENT – OUR *PERSONAL* RESPONSIBILITY

As I write this, 224 miles north, in Glasgow, the UN will bring together 120 world leaders and delegations to discuss the challenging issues preventing countries curbing emissions and meeting the goal of limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees above pre-industrial levels by 2100. This is the 26<sup>th</sup> 'conference of parties' – hence COP26. It will run from Oct 31 to Nov 12 and comes at a pivotal moment for the planet.

We can hope some progress can be made, but like many I am not optimistic. Greed, excess and conspicuous consumption will mostly continue across the developed World. Basically, the last 200 years of exponential industrial and population growth have been subsidized by ancient, compacted sunlight. The saddest consequence of the excess consumption of the developed nations is that the poorest and least developed populations with the lowest CO2 emissions will face the worst consequences of human-induced climate change. In short, the 1<sup>st</sup> World is destroying the 3<sup>rd</sup> by its greed. The richest nations have a moral responsibility to help the world's poorest. Sir David claims that it would be "really catastrophic" if we ignored 3<sup>rd</sup> World problems and that "*If we don't act now, it'll be too late.*"

The environment is now an area of focus for Rotary. To quote Rotary International: 'Rotary is a global network of 1.2 million neighbours, friends, leaders, and problem-solvers who see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change – across the globe, in our communities, and in *ourselves*'. 1.2 million is not a large number within a World population of around 7.8 BILLION. However, Rotarians are problem solvers. Collectively, even small steps can make a real difference. As Rotarians we can lead, encourage, and support others to do likewise.

Sir David Attenborough has also said that "*Every day that goes by in which we don't do something about it is a day wasted.*" Please do focus on 'the environment' – in the widest sense – and do a little every day – don't waste a day.

ROTARY CLUB MEETING – THURSDAY OCTOBER 14<sup>TH</sup>  
PDG ROTARIAN GRAHAM JACKSON MPH  
MY LIFE AS A CORONER



Our meeting on October 14th, featured PDG Graham Jackson, giving his insights into his busy career as a Coroner.

With more than 15 people in attendance, Graham gave an interesting talk about this interesting career.

Born in 1952 in Eccles, Graham told us about his early days in a terraced house. He went on to become the first in his family to go to university obtaining a law degree in Liverpool, articulated in Salford, and in 1978 became officially qualified after writing two exams a day for seven days. His eldest daughter is also now a solicitor for the past 12 years. Graham started off in private practice but then entered public service in 1980.

Graham went to work for the county court, working his way up to become the principal advocate at Manchester Court, frequently attending inquests and appearing before coroners. He was asked to become an assistant coroner, eventually becoming the chief coroner. As a coroner he is classed as a judge, carrying the red book of a judge while solicitors carry a blue book. He is also a member of the Coroner Society and has acted in various positions and is now part of the national training team for coroners. He also goes out to a scene when necessary.

Two significant cases in his career included the Dale Cregan case, a case involving the murder of four people, including the death of two female police officers. He was also involved with the Moor murders protocol.

Graham also explained that wigs and gowns are no longer worn and that surprisingly, the Coroner System is based on French procedures and traditions.

**ROTARY CLUB MEETING – THURSDAY OCTOBER 28, 2021**  
**KEN NIXON – PRESIDENT ROTARY CLUB OF BELFAST**  
**LIFE AFTER THIRTY-THREE YEARS ON THE BENCH**



The Zoom meeting on Thursday October 28<sup>th</sup>, featured our guest speaker, Ken Nixon, president of the Rotary Club of Belfast. With more than 15 members in attendance, Ken told us about his interesting career as a judge for thirty-three years, some of these in turbulent times.

**Highlights from the Presentation**

Ken brought greetings from our fellow 1911 club, the Rotary Club of Belfast and reflected that President Roy had attended Belfast's Centenary Celebrations in Belfast. He also referred to the great work of the then Lord Lieutenant of Belfast, now Lady Mary Peters, through the Mary Peters Trust in supporting young Northern Ireland athletes. Of the 38 Northern Ireland athletes who went to Tokyo, 33 were funded by the Trust at some point in their career.


Ken looked back on 33 years 'on the bench' in Northern Ireland and went on a 'light hearted' tour of Courthouses and cases throughout the Province including a 26 defendant three week 'riot case' in Londonderry following a visit by John Major, after the first IRA ceasefire, and a particular cold day on February 21st 1994 at Clogher Petty Sessions " All was not well at twenty past ten on the 3rd Monday of the month in Clogher court".

He related stories of his two main courts, Craigavon and the challenges there of Garvaghy Road rioting and for a final 10 years in the busy lists of Belfast's Laganside. Ken reflected on a former colleague's book, 'Its like this Your Worship', the five most common words in his court. The stories ranged from dangerous dogs (put down or saved) to cruise liner captains breaching ' seafaring regulations' and a Solicitor's description of a Monday morning in No 6 court's criminal list as a mixed theme of the Jeremy Kyle

For every blister packet collected, Teracyle will donate points to Superdrug pharmacies to be redeemed into financial donations towards Marie Curie.

**Plastic bottle tops** – washed and clean. These go to the Plastic Shed in Stockport, who recycle them into various plastic products and run workshops (for adults and children), see: <https://www.plasticshed.org/>



## How to stay safe online

Humberside Police issue advice on how to protect yourself on digital devices and social media.

### Steps you can take include:

Ensure the privacy settings on your profile as high as possible, so that only your friends can see your posts, pictures and details.

Never disclose private information such as your phone number, pictures of your home, your address or birthday. This applies to your posts and your profile

Don't accept friend requests from people you don't know. Some online criminals use this as a means of phishing or finding blackmail or sexual offences victims.

Don't do anything you're not comfortable with.
